

The European Alliance for Social Sciences and Humanities expresses deep concerns about the current budget developments regarding Horizon Europe

In a critical period for Europe and the world, Horizon Europe must take the insights of what has been learnt in 2020 into the next period. The current pandemic crisis clearly showed that:

- scientific progress and technological advances provide potential long-term solutions to challenges and crises
- trust, care, solidarity and democratic values are key to the resilience of our societies
- individual behaviours, citizens' participation, community responses and public policies will underpin any robust and sustainable recovery in the future.

We draw two conclusions from the current period:

- more money, not less must to be invested in research
- embedding the social, cultural and political aspects in research and policy design is key
 if we want to avoid partial solutions to current and future challenges.

Regrettably the current budget discussion for Horizon Europe is not progressing in the right direction on these two fronts. The discussion reflects:

- short-term considerations and political infighting and will not provide EU scientific research with the resources to lead globally.
- inadequate decisions regarding the crucial role of societal contexts for scientific progress and technological advances in all domains i.e. health, climate, artificial intelligence, energy, biodiversity, food, security.

EASSH members are deeply concerned that Horizon Europe risks developing only partial solutions if the huge imbalance in research funding is not addressed. They consider that the current budget discussion does not recognise the crucial place of the societal dimension across all clusters and does earmark insufficient resources for the Cluster devoted to SSH-driven societal issues. Any amount under €1,5bn for that cluster would trigger numerous negative reactions across research communities, civil society associations and think tanks.

EASSH has called for a balanced investment across the different clusters of Horizon Europe in our position paper <u>Resources for Clusters in Horizon Europe</u> and has demonstrated the role of societal research in time of crisis with the paper on <u>Mission Covid 19: Global problems need a research portfolio approach</u>.

EASSH invites the Member States, the European Commission and the European Parliament to ensure a real balance in how Horizon Europe is equipped to invest in societal research to help tackle current and future challenges. Balance will need to apply to the various components of the programme: (a) to fundamental research and individual scholarship (ERC and Marie Sklodowska-Curie), (b) to the research directed at application as in clusters and missions, (c) to infrastructures and networks.
